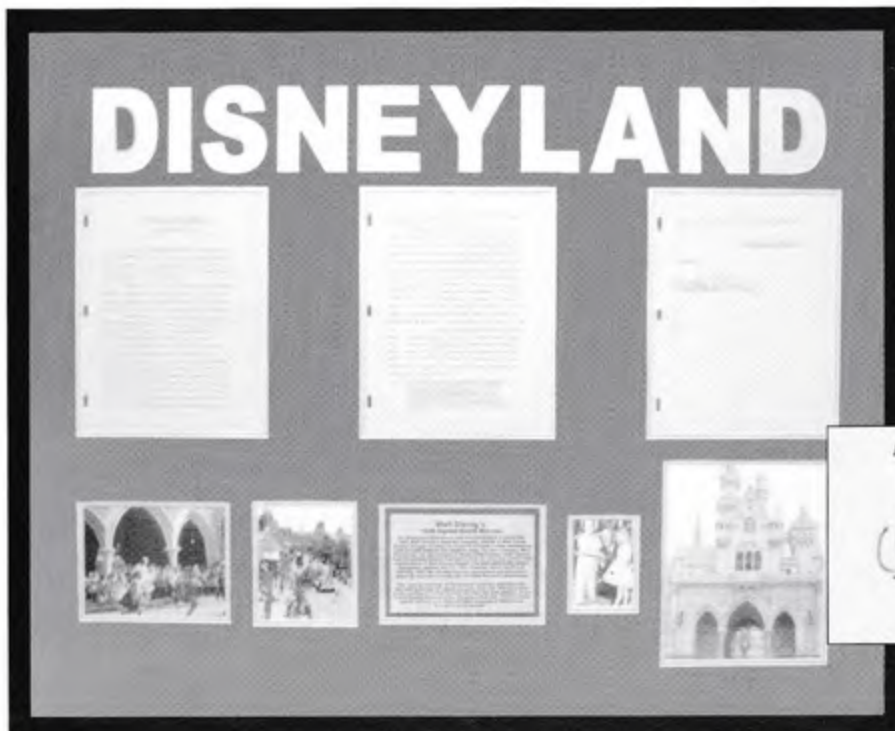

I was greatly relieved. The fuzing system had worked.

The only tiny window in the forward cabin was at the navigator's desk, so I didn't see the instant of detonation or the fireball. And Colonel Tibbets, plane commander (and head of the 509th Group) was taking the Enola Gay in a tight right turn away from the bomb.

Suddenly the tail gunner, George Caron, reported over the intercom that a bright ring was racing toward the plane. Then a first shock wave hit the plane. I had not yet moved over to the rear windows.

The plane was jolted sharply as the shock wave passed. The second wave, a reflection from the ground, indicated to me, from the estimated time between the waves, that detonation had occurred about 2000 feet above Hiroshima. This roughly confirmed that the radar fuzing had performed as designed.

By the time I was able to observe the ground through Dutch Van Kirk's navigator's window, the churning mass of smoke was rushing outward with some visible at the moving edges - and the massive mushroom shaped cloud was rushing upward.

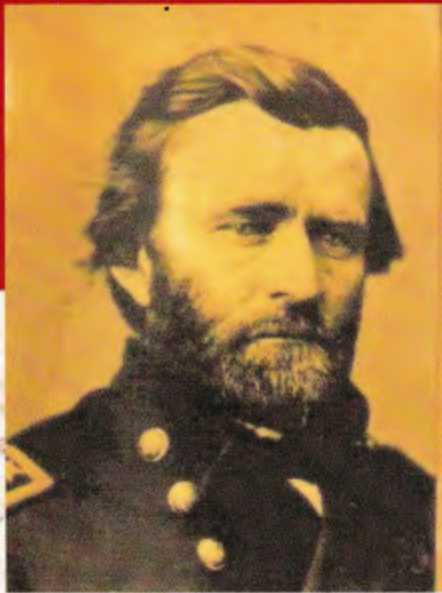
